THE EXPANSION OF OHIO'S MEDICAID PROGRAM under the federal Affordable Care Act (ACA) created new opportunities for thousands of Marion residents to gain real access to health care for the first time in history. Our agency was charged with meeting the huge public demand for access to the new Medicaid program while also working through the challenges of learning and implementing new and evolving technology. Ultimately, Marion County led the state in the initial enrollment of newly eligible people. We were uplifted by the many personal stories of how long-awaited medical treatment renewed hope and positively transformed families.

Another notable undertaking was the first "Kicks for Kids" project, which provided school shoes to kids in grades K-12. The positive response from parents, grandparents, teachers, store employees, and community organizations was overwhelming. Read more about the program later in this report.

More importantly, it is our privilege to be able to see the results of our efforts when we wait at the doctor's office, stand in line at the grocery store, attend a graduation ceremony, send someone off to a new job, or see a child looking down at their new shoes while walking to school. 2014 was challenging... and it was great.

#### **CHILD SUPPORT SERVICES**

Marion County Child Support (CSEA) is continuing to improve services. Since many parents ordered to pay child support are returning to society from prison, CSEA has focused on assisting these parents in obtaining manageable orders and educating them about waiver and compromise. During 2014, CSEA was recognized for outstanding performance as the most improved Support Order Establishment for the Medium Caseload Division by the Ohio Department of Job & Family Services.

### **KICKS FOR KIDS**

Kicks For Kids is a program developed to provide school shoes for children in need. This program, unique to Marion County, was designed and deployed over a period of six weeks with a committed team of agency staff coordinating with participating local retailers. All involved worked tirelessly to ensure kids in need had new, well-fitting, "cool" shoes for the first day of school. Agency staff volunteered to work overtime to process the applications so that the children would receive their shoes before school began. Approximately 960 applications were processed and 1.874 kids received shoes.

# A SUCCESS STORY — OHIOMEANSJOBS-MARION COUNTY

Sarah, a young mother of three, had completed her training as an RN and was having difficulty finding a job. She could not afford to take a final test for her licensure and had to register for Ohio Works First assistance. Barb, her Supportive Services case manager, helped her develop a plan to pay for her licensure and partnered with OMJ-Marion County to help Sarah find a job. Sarah's new career allows her to earn enough income so that she no longer needs the OWF assistance and is now proudly taking care of her family.

## **SUPPORTIVE SERVICES & WORK ACTIVITIES**

Supportive Services & Work Activities staff members work with people who receive Ohio Works First (cash assistance) and/or Food Assistance to enhance their employability. These programs offer job readiness training, work experience placements, and child care and transportation assistance while they work toward self-sufficiency. Adult Protective Services (APS) operates as a specialized service area, which investigates and resolves reports of elder abuse and neglect.

OhioMeansJobs-Marion County provides employment resources and business services. We strive to meet the needs of job seekers, in partnership with training providers and businesses. Our goal is to help people find meaningful and rewarding employment opportunities. Our services include job skills training, resume and interview assistance, access to job postings, job search resources and workshops.

We also provide a broad range of services to businesses. These services include job posting, applicant screening, applicant referrals, and assistance with the cost of on-the-job training, skill proficiency testing, pre-employment assessment, analysis of labor market information, and recruiting.

## 2014 QUICK FACTS:

- 297 local businesses received workforce development services.
- 2,912 hires were facilitated through OMJ-Marion County.
- 19,877 visits to OMJ-Marion County.
- 204 youth worked 38,165 hours earning \$368,658.00 in the 2014 Youth Employment programs.
- \$520,466.89 was spent on providing Workforce Investment Act services to youth, adults, dislocated workers and businesses.



#### A SUCCESS STORY — CHILD SUPPORT SERVICES

JOE, a struggling father, wanted to be able to provide for his children. However he had difficulty finding a job due to many factors including homelessness, hunger, lack of a high school diploma, and past legal trouble. A CSEA case manager started meeting with Joe regularly and referred him to OhioMeansJobs-Marion County, where they helped him obtain reliable employment. He now has a place to live, food, and he is able to provide for his children through child support payments. Joe sent the following note to his case manager: "Thank you for believing in me and working with me. I have my driver's license now. I am saving to get a car soon. I am staying positive. I may even be a team leader for my shift (at work)."
